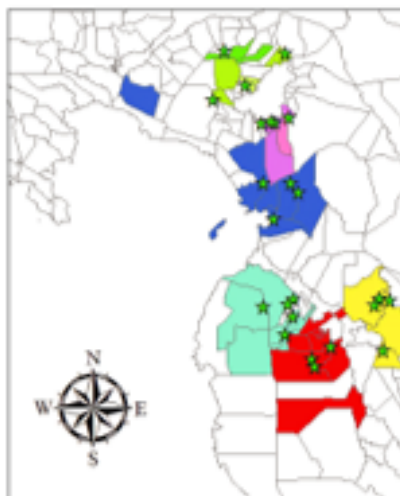

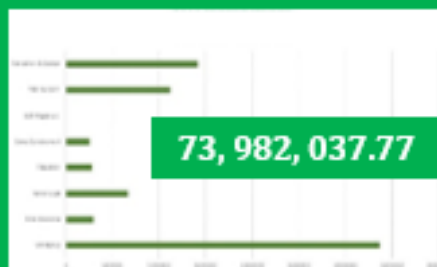

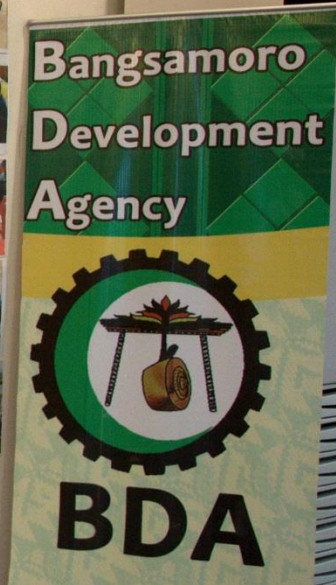

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# Executive Summary

In 2019, the Bangsamoro welcomed the advent of decade-long quest for Bangsamoro Governance, when the YES Vote to Bangsamoro Organic Law (BOL) won in January 21, 2019 referendum and after the official of the Philippine Government's Commission on Elections (COMELEC)<sup>i</sup> the BOL is finally ratified.

The Bangsamoro Development Agency (BDA) joined the rest of the Bangsamoro for this historic milestone and immediately acted upon to align its strategic direction to this continuing changing political landscape in the region.

Towards this goal, the BDA with the support of partners organized strategic planning to review, update years of accomplishments and experience and to work together to identify ways forward in consideration of the current Bangsamoro situation.

While this was happening, development initiatives continued to take place, this time we focus on the community development in the camps through the Mindanao Trust Fund- Reconstruction and Development Project Phase II (MTFRDP/2), which was launched in April 2018<sup>ii</sup>. From this project, there were 28 socio-economic infrastructure sub-projects implemented, completed and turned over to its respective community beneficiaries; 1, 613 completers of Alternative Learning System (ALS) and 30 members of the Joint Task Forces on Camps

Transformation (JTFCT) who underwent various capacity building activities. All these were geared towards the overall objective of the camp development project as informed by the Normalization Component of the Comprehensive Agreement on the Bangsamoro (CAB) that aims to transform the said camps from conflict to peaceful and productive communities.

Support from partners continued coming in like the Turkey Government. This includes the following: 1) construction and completion of education and health facilities funded by the Turkish Cooperation and Coordination Agency (TIKA); 2) health mission for the orphans and screening for the Bangsamoro with training on pharmaceutical and health forum from University of Health Sciences (UHS); 3) visit to health institutions by Alliance of International Doctors in Turkey; 4) implementation of Ramadhan and Qurban Program, among others<sup>iii</sup>.

The spirit of volunteerism remains as strength of BDA and the Muslim Blood Donation (MBD) founded to contribute to the continuing blood necessity in the region that enabled the agency to receive various citations for its outstanding support to the National Voluntary Blood Services Program and for collecting a total of 1, 033 blood units for the Year 2019.

Reaching for humanity was still among the priorities of the BDA. The agency, through the help of its volunteers and

development catalysts, was able to extend assistance to the affected families of the earthquake in the municipalities of North Cotabato on December 2019.

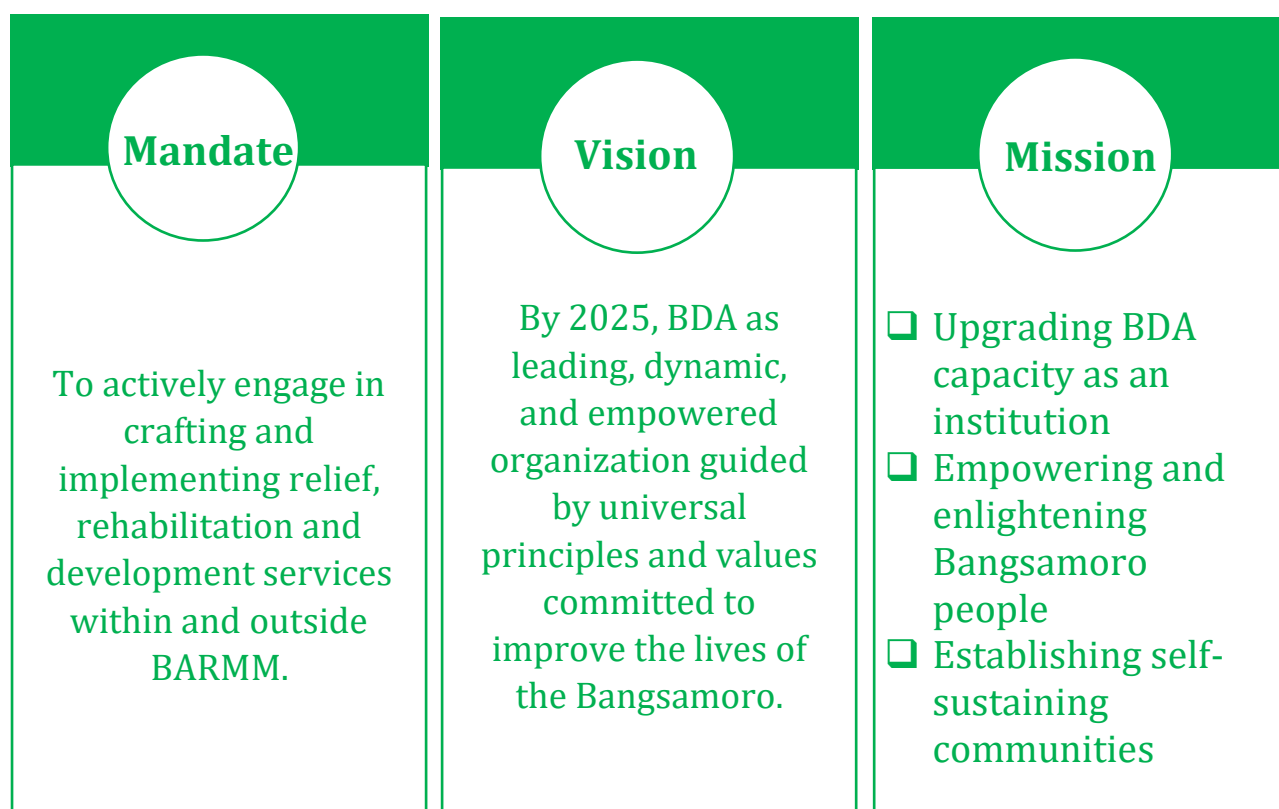
In the post-conflict situation, the BDA shall support the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) by complementing or supporting the newly established government in the delivery of services and interventions that shall provide immediate results that matters most to the lives of the people in the Bangsamoro communities. Further, the agency commits to support the BARMM in the realization of its thrust on moral governance through the conduct of Values Transformation Training (VTT) for the officials and employees of BARMM agencies<sup>iv</sup>, and their local and institutional partners.

Also in year, the BDA continues to work with both local and international development partners in line with its goal on strengthened BDA capacity on networking and linkages. The agency attended and participated various activities organized by partners both

within and outside the country. BDA also received visitors to its office in Cotabato City for courtesy calls and discussion for possible collaboration and partnerships.

Before the year ends, BDA was able to finally register to the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), making the agency a duly registered non-government organization.

Working for 17 years and still counting, with the experiences, lessons learned and accomplishments through the years, and with the current setting in the Bangsamoro, BDA is firm to continue to prove its relevance as a strategic organization with regard to Bangsamoro humanitarian, rehabilitation and development. Equipped with the spirit of volunteerism, BDA will remain, to serve the Bangsamoro within and beyond BARMM areas.

# Accomplishments

## I nstitutional Development

### Becoming a non-government organization (NGO)

On November 29, 2019, the BDA was registered to the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) forming the agency as duly listed NGO with the official name of **BDA, Inc.** with **CN201967967**. With this, the BDA has gained legal identity that enables the agency to operate and link in full throttle with various development partners.

**New Management.** When the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) was established in February 2019 after the ratification of the Bangsamoro Organic Law (BOL) in January 2019, major transitions happened in BDA. It underwent swift reorganization because key officials of the agency were appointed to the newly created Bangsamoro Transition Authority (BTA). Engr. Windel P. Diangcalan took the seat of the executive directorship of the BDA on March 31, 2019<sup>1</sup>. Abusaliha M. Macacuna became the new chairman of the BDA Board of Directors (BOD) effective August 26, 2019<sup>2</sup>.



### Development of Strategic Plan for 2019-2025.

With the current Bangsamoro political landscape, the BDA as development agency of the MILF has to align with the changing situation in the peace process to stay relevant and strategic agency as it continues to be of service to Bangsamoro. The BDA Strategic Plan carries the new mandate, along with vision, mission and goals of the agency from 2019 until 2025.

**Working as Program Management Office.** On March 26, 2019, the BDA signed Program Partnership Agreement with the Ittihadun Madaris Bil Philippines, Inc. (IMBPI)<sup>4</sup> for the Strengthening Capacities for Delivery of Early Childhood Education for Children Living in the CAAM after Program Cooperation Agreement signed between the BDA and UNICEF on March 26, 2019. For this program, BDA functions as program management office, which is considered as level-up role of the agency in the post-conflict situation. It is noted that BDA has been managing projects wherein funds are coursed through partner organizations that served as fund conduits. That was an agreed fiduciary arrangement then since other development

partners cannot directly download the funds to BDA due to the absence of the so called “legal personality” (before its SEC Registration). With the role as program management office, BDA is now sharing its knowledge and transferring skills and expertise gained from years of experiences in the field of program management with other local partner organizations towards the promotion of transparency, excellence and sustainability.

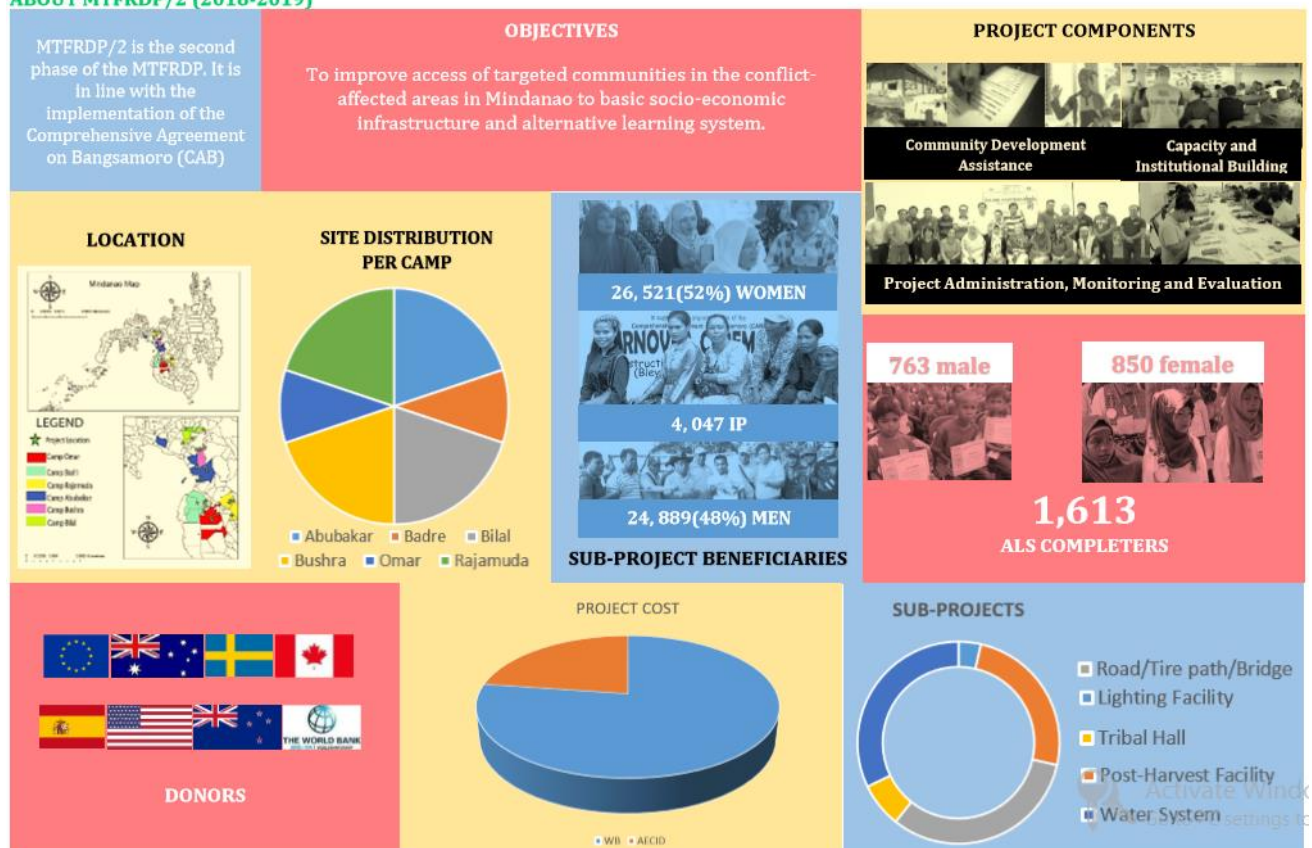
**Sustained Volunteerism of Development Catalysts.** Volunteerism has been the heart and life blood of BDA since its inception. Over the years, especially in the Regional Management Office in Central Mindanao, self-sustained initiatives like the regular conduct of quarterly meetings and Values Transformation Training (VTT) were carried out at the community level to demonstrate the spirit of volunteerism and continue to build the confidence and faith among the development catalysts who are BDA’s strong foundation of strength and inspiration as an organization.

## C community development in the camps

In 2014, the Comprehensive Agreement on Bangsamoro (CAB) was signed by the GPH and the MILF, which served as final peace agreement of both parties. Under this document is the Normalization that refers to the socio-economic component intended for the transformation of conflict communities into peaceful and productive communities.

In 2018, the BDA as development arm of the MILF carrying on with the primary mandate of rehabilitation and development in the CAAM together with the development partners joined hands towards the Normalization in the Bangsamoro. BDA signed the Program Partnership Agreement (PPA) for the Mindanao Trust Fund- Reconstruction and Development Project Phase II (MTFRDP/2) with the Community and Family Services International (CFSI) on April 2018.

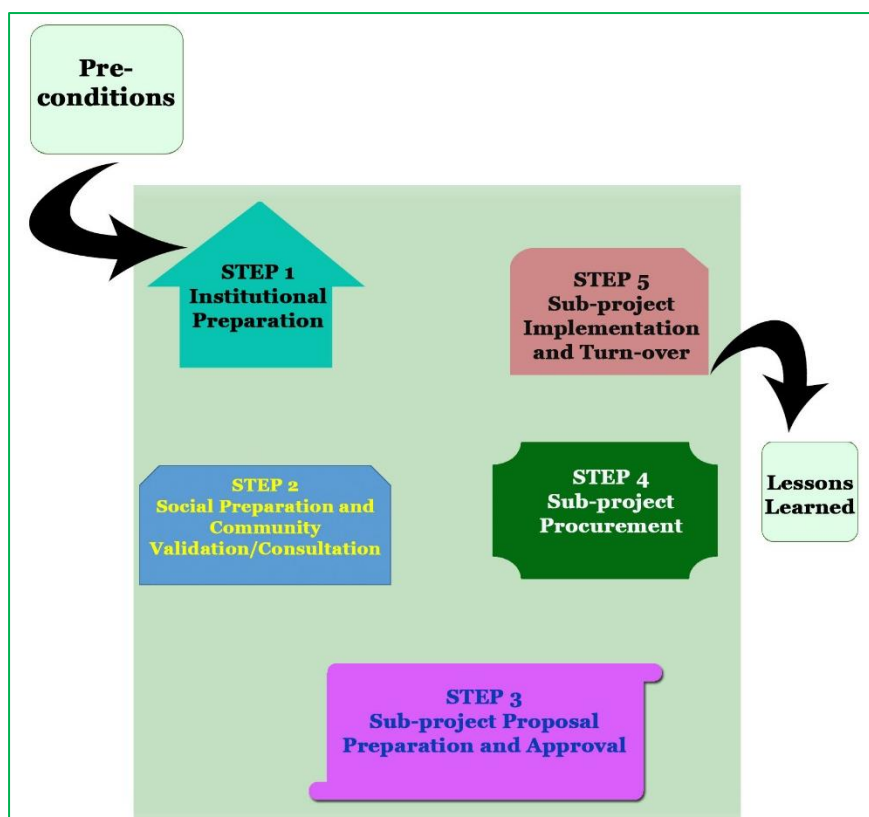

Originating from the context of MTFRDP Phase I, the implementation of the MTFRDP/2 employed the community-driven development (CDD), a program strategy that promotes inclusivity and encourages participation of all stakeholders and all sectors in the community.



Step 1 on institutional preparation, Step 2 for the beginning of the works at the community level, Step 3 for the preparation of the sub-project proposals, Step 4 for the procurement process, and Step 5 for the implementation of the sub-projects up until the completion of the overall implementation.

## ACCOMPLISHMENTS (MTF2 APRIL 2018-AUGUST 2019)

### Improving access to basic-socio economic infrastructure

The 21 socio-economic infrastructure projects (SEI) implemented under the MTFRDP/2 were significant in improving the access of communities in remote areas in terms of time, distance and cost. 99% (around 11% are IPs) or 42, 321 beneficiaries reported to have improved access to SEIs that helped them uplift their living conditions.

## **Building capacities for community empowerment**

**Community trainings for project management and sustainability.** The people's organizations (POs) that were formed in each community recipient takes responsibility of the operation and management of the sub-projects implemented and turned over to them. To ensure that they have the enough knowledge and skills, various capacity building activities were organized for them such as values training, procurement training, leadership, sub-project management, operation and maintenance, financial literacy and management, and among others.

**Education in camps.** Education in camps through the implementation of the Alternative Learning System (ALS) as one sub-component of the MTFRDP/2 touched the lives of many in the communities.

ALS aims to cater to the education needs of vulnerable groups, particularly out of school youth, women, orphans and indigenous people.

Children, mothers, women, youth, fathers, elderlies, person with the disabilities (PWDs), and the IPs who all have stories of disappointment to formal schooling speak highly of the ALS as



to its great impact to their lives. The opportunity to attend school, meet and learn the ABCs, count numbers, being able to read basic words, write their names, are great achievements for the learners.



**FROM BATTLEFIELD TO LEARNING GROUND.** Years, ago these men would gather to plan together in the context of war, but now, they are convened to discuss development matters for their communities. The photos shown features the members of the TFCT and of the BIAF of MILF during the priority listing of projects conducted to identify development assistance that will respond to the needs of communities in the six major camps of the MILF- on the road towards a productive and peaceful Bangsamoro community.



One of the components of the camp development project through the MTFRDP/2, is capacity and institutional building, wherein among the objectives is to provide assistance to the Joint Task Forces on Camps Transformation (JTFCT) of the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) who would be capacitated for, among others, project development and management, community organizing and monitoring and evaluation of projects.

Over the past months, said objective was successfully achieved through facilitation of various trainings for the TFCT members that gradually developed their understanding and capacities as agents of development in the respective camps.

Members of the Camp TFCT, who were former combatants of the MILF, selected to undergo capacity building trainings to become productive member of the community in transformation from conflict to peace shared stories of transformation by their experiences from the implementation of the MTFRDP/2-AECID.



## MTFRDP/2 ADDITIONAL FUNDING (SEPTEMBER 2019-SEPTEMBER 2020)

With the intention to sustain the positive impact of community development in the camps, the MTFRDP/2 additional financing was agreed in September 2019. The project has the same approach of CDD as program implementation set-up. There are eight barangays covered across the six major camps of the MILF.

As of this writing, the BDA as project implementing unit (PIU) accomplished major activities from STEP 1 to STEP 3 of the project. Sub-project proposals for four out of the eight sub-projects were packaged, appraised at the TFCT level and was submitted to CFSI as project management unit of the MTFRDP/2.

## Implementation and completion of TIKA funded health and education facilities

BDA with support from the Turkish Cooperation and Coordination Agency (TIKA) implemented the construction and completion of five units of school building (with four classroom each) and three units of birthing clinic in selected communities in the regions of Central Mindanao, Davao and Ranaw.

## Distribution of intervention to the affected families of earthquake in some areas of North Cotabato

On December 1, 2019, the BDA staff, and development catalysts distributed 471 packages of food items to the affected families of earthquake in some areas of North Cotabato specifically in the barangays of Galidan, New Capitol and Banayal in Tulunan town, and in Brgy. West Patadon of Matalam municipality. This mission was successfully undertaken through the support of MILF Political Committee, Social Welfare Committee and partner organization, and the Muslim Youth Brotherhood.



## Thousand families benefit from Qurban Program 2019

People within and outside the BARMM areas gathered for the Eid'l Adha (feast of sacrifice) in their respective communities and received free beef distributed under the Qurbani Program 2019 from April 11- 13, 2019 across the identified barangays in Cotabato City, Marawi City, Maguindanao, North Cotabato and Sultan Kudarat provinces.

This year, the agency slaughtered 666 heads of cattle in partnership with the four (4) organizations from Turkey and one (1) organization from Malaysia namely: Deniz Fenerei Dernegi (108 cows), Turkiye Dyanet Vakfi (240 cows), Turkish Red Crescent (100 cows), Weltweiter Einsatz Fur Arme (70 cows with zakat to selected families), Insani Yardim Vakfi (100), Sadaqatasi (43) and the Amal Foundation (5 cows) from Malaysia.

The Program was implemented by the BDA staff and development catalysts, MILF political committee, MILF Social Welfare Committee, and Bangsamoro Islamic Armed Forces (BIAF) to ensure unity and cooperation that led to the success of the program.

The agency has been implementing Qurban Program since 2014 with support from various donors, especially the Turkish Government.

## Ramadhan Program



A mother, in Brgy. Kitango, Datu Saudi Ampatuan in Maguindanao province is one of the beneficiaries of the food pack distribution during the Ramadhan Program 2019. She is carrying 10 kilos of rice (and other food items) for her family.

In Bangsamoro region, thousands of families still belong to the poorest of the poor, so the opportunity to be a recipient of humanitarian aid is a great help for them and their families.

Each year, BDA implements special activities and program in observance of the Holy month of Ramadhan. In 2019, serving of free Iftar (breaking of fast) and food pack distribution were made possible through the support of various humanitarian foundation from Turkey like Insani Yardim Vakfi (IHH), Turkiye Dyanet Vakfi (TDV), Sadaqatasi and TIKA.

The breakthrough activity for BDA during the year for this holy month was the conduct of series of forum in the BARMM compound. This was the first time that BDA has organized such activity intended for the employees of the newly Bangsamoro government.



Regular activities such as study circle among BDA staff was also sustained during this Ramadhan Program.



## Orphan Care



The Orphan Care Program of BDA is part of the humanitarian objective of the agency, with support from IHH. During the year, the program was expanded since a new orphanage center was opened to improve the care for the children.

For the year, there were 142 number of in-house orphans (Kakar and Tamontaka). These children benefit free accommodation, food and schooling (transportation and school supplies). In-house orphans also avail social activities such as orphans' solidarity days, world orphans day and among others. In a year, visitors from various organizations in Turkey came to see the orphans for a special activity with presents for the children.

Aside from this, there were 535 number of distant orphans in the regions of Central Mindanao, Southern Mindanao, Davao, Ranaw, Zamboanga-Peninsula, and Zamboanga Basilan who were receiving monthly allowance from the program.

### **Moro orphans graduate with excellence, pray that no more children orphaned by war**

Hanadia Mohammad, 13 lost her father when she was two years old due to war in Mindanao. Since then, her mother Guiamisa Kedal solely manage taking care of their family through farming.



In 2015, her mother learned about the orphan care program of IHH Turkey with BDA as local partner and decided to send Hanadia and the her other older sister to the orphanage to get full support for their education.

“Even that I am alone now without their father, I am really working hard to send them, their other siblings to school to get education, which I believe will help them to have better future”, the mother said.



With the achievements of her children like Hanadia who completed Arabic education as top one in the class along with other awards, Mrs. Guiamisa is blessed enough for her sacrifices. Hanadia’s sister is one of the scholars brought to Turkey to pursue high school education where she has to maintain required grades to avail the program.

Hanadia is just one of the eleven graduates of elementary Arabic education under the orphan care program.

## Muslim Blood Donation (MBD)

The Muslim Blood Donation (MBD) is a regular program of the BDA since 2008, which aims to contribute to the continuing blood necessity in Central Mindanao.

The agency received National Voluntary Blood Services Program Sandugo Award 2018 as one of the *Top Performing non-LGU partner* from Department of Health (DOH) Region-12 on August 23, 2019 at Greenleaf Hotel, General Santos City.



For 2019, there were 1, 033 blood units collected for MBD, 6 silvers medals and 15 bronze medals received for the consistent blood donors of the program; and the program was recognized and awarded as Top Performing non-LGU for 2018 NVSP.

## Health Mission for the Orphans

In coordination with the University of Health Sciences in Istanbul, Turkey and the Bangsamoro Medical Society (BMS), the BDA facilitated medical mission dubbed as “Health Screening for the Bangsamoro” from February 6-10, 2019 in selected communities in Cotabato City, Maguindanao and North Cotabato, where hundreds of Bangsamoro people, children, adult, mother, father, and elderlies flocked to avail the health assistance offered.



## MILF Modest Food Relief off to Marawi City

This initiative was based on the directives of the MILF intended for the people of Marawi City who were in recovery from the effect of the crisis happened in their city in 2017.

The mission benefited 5,000 people coming from eight selected communities in Marawi City, Lanao del Sur and Lanao Norte.

Distribution of the food items was facilitated by the BDA in coordination with the MILF Political Committee, Social Welfare Committee and the BIAF on January 26, 2019.

A medical mission was also part of this undertaking where hundreds of Marawi Siege survivors received free health check-up and basic medicines from medical professionals and volunteers.





# R ecognition and Linkages

Over the past years, the BDA was able to establish and strengthen relationship and networking with various organization both local and international. This has helped BDA expand its links and partnerships for knowledge and experience sharing, collaboration and cooperation for stronger approach on development initiatives and programs.

With this legal identity acquired, the BDA can now fully realize its mandate with partner organizations from both the government and the international development partners. BDA is looking forward to work as NGO that can directly coordinate with funding agencies in hope that more development assistance will be carried to the people and communities in need in the Bangsamoro.

The BDA with the clear guidance and directions from its principal, the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF), can and will go further to continue serving the Bangsamoro in the context of the current landscape in the region.

BDA is determined and committed to implement and complete the community development in the camps, with SEI projects that will improve the access of communities to basic services and, through the ALS for basic literacy among target beneficiaries and with technical skills that is hoped to aid the livelihood of the communities. This also includes the continuing technical assistance for the TFCT members to develop them into productive members of the society.

Humanitarian mission will remain as priority of the BDA, responding to affected families and communities of both natural and man-made calamities. This includes care for the orphans, voluntary blood donation, Ramadhan and Qurban Program, and among others.

The plan to strengthen its working force and volunteerism, is also on the list for BDA. As an agency living with the spirit of volunteerism, the BDA will always credit its sustainability to the dedication of its people. Thus, for the coming years, BDA is determined to correspond to the needs of its community for sustainability and continuing service for Bangsamoro.

With years of experience in development works and knowledge on administrative and financial management, social preparation, project planning, management, monitoring and evaluation, data management, documentation, BDA is committed to share the knowledge with other partners including BARMM agencies in fulfilment of its earlier mandate of “building the capacity of the Bangsamoro for future governance role”.

Now with the updated mandate and strategic direction for 2019 onwards, BDA is optimistic to deliver more services for communities in need, for more partnerships and collaboration, to grow further as institution to become more effective and efficient in performing the tasks expected towards the vision of building the better life and better community for Bangsamoro.



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- i BOL is the law that provided the creation of the Bangsamoro Government (BARMM) long been aspired by the Bangsamoro people- believed to be responsive to the needs and way of life of the Bangsamoro.
  - ii MTRDP/2 On April 2018, the Program Partnership Agreement for the Mindanao Trust Fund- Reconstruction and Development Project Phase II (MTRDP/2) was signed between the Bangsamoro Development Agency (BDA) and the Community and Family Services International (CFSI). Location for the project was across the six previously acknowledged MILF Camps namely: Abubakar, Badre, Bilal, Bushra, Omar and Rajamuda. Project objectives was to improve access of targeted communities in the conflict-affected areas in Mindanao to basic socio-economic infrastructure and alternative learning system.
  - iii Ramadhan Program 2019 was supported Turkiye Dyanet Vakfi, Insani Yardim Vakfi (IHH), Sadaqatasi and TIKA; while the Qurban Program 2019 was supported by the Turkiye Dyanet Vakfi, Insani Yardim Vakfi (IHH), Sadaqatasi, WEFA, Turkish Red Crescent, and Deniz Feneri Dernegi.
  - iv VTT in BARMM was facilitated by the BDA in support to the call for moral governance of the new Bangsamoro Government.
